Captioning in Higher Education: huh?

In 2010, CREEC and the Civil Rights Clinic at Denver Law filed an individual lawsuit on behalf of Troy Anderson, a prisoner in solitary at the Colorado State Penitentiary, asking (among other things) that he be permitted to exercise outdoors. At that time, CSP did not have outdoor yards. Mr. Anderson won on this issue, and was transferred; no yards were built. CREEC and the CRC filed a class action in 2013 which settled in 2015 with a promise to build outdoor yards. In April, 2017, we finally saw the results.

Settlement: Seattle to build thousands of sidewalk curb ramps over next 18 years



CREEC and co-counsel Goldstein Borgen Dardarian & Ho are challenging inaccessible curb ramps in a number of cities around the country. The team reached a landmark settlement with the City of Seattle that will result in thousands of additional ramps. Negotiations are ongoing in four other cities, and investigations in a number of others.

Reynoldson v. City of Seattle: Accessible Curb Ramps.

Red Rocks Amphitheatre is a beautiful outdoor concert venue owned by the City of Denver. Because wheelchair accessible seats are located only in the first and last rows, the desirable first row seats would sell out immediately, only to appear on scalper sites at inflated prices. CREEC, Disability Law Colorado and the Colorado Cross-Disability Coalition sued and **reached a settlement** requiring new ticketing and seating policies designed to prevent scalping of these valuable accessible tickets.





Lucas v. Denver: Equitable Ticketing Policies at Red Rocks.




The Pepsi Center is Denver's basketball/hockey arena. CREEC represented a Deaf woman in a class action seeking captioning at sporting events. We reached a settlement in which the arena's owner **agreed to provide open captioning on four LED boards** around the fascia boards on the third level.

We continue to work with the ACLU of Montana and ACLU National Prison Project to help the Montana Department of Corrections come into compliance with the ADA.



We continue to handle numerous cases – both in litigation and informally – seeking effective communication for Deaf people in medical and law enforcement contexts.



We are working with volunteer attorney Amanda Upson and the Name Change Project to help trans*
Coloradoans change their names and gender markers on legal documents.


Other Litigation Activities

Discrimination is illegal – and can be challenged in court – even if the target intentionally put him/herself in a discriminatory situation to investigate it and bring it to light.* CREEC continues to investigate:



Businesses that discriminate on the basis of race, sexual orientation, or gender identity.







Religious discrimination in employment ads.

* My paraphrase of "individuals who, without an intent to rent or purchase a home or apartment, pose as renters or purchasers for the purpose of collecting evidence of unlawful [housing] practices" have standing to sue under the Fair Housing Act. ""That the tester may have approached the real estate agent fully expecting that he would receive false information, and without any intention of buying or renting a home, does not negate the simple fact of injury within the meaning of" the Fair Housing Act. Havens Realty Corp. v. Coleman, 455 U.S. 363, 373, 374-75 (1982).

Common ADA Access Myths


- · No building is "grandfathered in."

- There is no "good faith" defense: access is mandatory.





clamshell.


